




## Leadership

- On July 1, the college welcomed Quint Molina, dean of business, career and technical education, and Cullen Scarborough, dean of workforce development, military programs and adult education.
- Dr. Sheena Brown was appointed interim vice president for academics on February 15, and
   Dr. Wendy Davis was appointed executive vice president for administration.
- **Dr. James Perey** was named the 12<sup>th</sup> president of Cochise College on December 18, 2024. He started his new role on February 15, 2025 (*upper right*).
- In spring, Dr. J.D. Rottweiler retired as Cochise College president after serving for more than 15 years. The college hosted retirement parties on the Douglas and Sierra Vista campuses. Dr. Rottweiler also received the distinguished title of president emeritus (lower right).





- During the 2024 election, **Stephanie Money** was elected to represent Precinct 5 on the Governing Board. She replaced Dennis Nelson, who did not seek re-election after serving 12 years on the board. She and **Jane Strain**, Precinct 3, were sworn into office at the January 14, 2025, Governing Board meeting (upper right).
- On April 16, 2025, Governing Board member Tim Quinn resigned. Stephen (Steve) Leeder was appointed as his replacement for Precinct 4 on May 13, 2025 by Cochise County Schools Superintendent Dr. Jacqui Clay (lower right).
- In June, **Jane Strain** resigned and was named trustee emeritus in recognition of 27 years of dedicated service to the college and community as the Governing Board member for Precinct 3 (*lower left*).







### Purposeful Innovation

The college remains committed to innovative advancement in programs, tools, and strategies designed to meet the evolving needs of students and the community.

- The Firearms Training Complex First Shot Ribbon Cutting Ceremony was held December 16 at the Sierra Vista Campus (upper right).
- In December, the redesigned cochise.edu
  website went live. The new site features a fresh,
  upbeat design and an emphasis on accessibility.

- New this year! The Academic Advising & Career Services staff offered Lunch & Learn sessions to support students in study skills, self-care and career skills. ### Cochise College students have bright futures due to innovative collaboration and the generosity of our community partners.

- The college was notified of a pledge that would establish the Ann Marie Stephens Viticulture Program, which would provide students with the skills and knowledge to succeed in the growing wine industry. The financial commitment would fund an endowed faculty position and scholarships (right).
- Members of the women's and men's basketball teams volunteered at local fall festivities and earned more than \$16,000 for their programs.
- In partnership with Consulmex Douglas, 21 IME Becas scholarship awards were presented to Cochise College students in November (opposite, lower left).
- Fifteen businesses and organizations financially supported the Senior and Non-Traditional Student scholarships by sponsoring the Cochise College Foundation's fifth annual Pathway to \$150k Virtual Run/Walk/Cycle. Nineteen other patrons participated in the production of a calendar that inspires donors to continue their support of the college.




# A Bright Future


As we look ahead, Cochise College continues to be future-focused.


Quick Facts & Demographics 2024-2025





## Local Opportunities Inspire Student Journeys to Success

on't we all need and appreciate feel-good stories? As a former board member of the Boys & Girls Club of Bisbee, and an enthusiastic current member of the Cochise College Foundation board of directors, I can tell you the following makes both organizations proud and will warm your heart.

A native of Naco, Arizona, Priscilla Venegas grew up surrounded by the beauty of the desert, a close-knit

community, and the law enforcement presence that helps keep the peace. So when the time came to go to college, she felt drawn to the study of administration of justice but also a bit uncomfortable about leaving the area.

She chose to enter the welcoming environment of Cochise College, where the Ralph Italia Memorial

Scholarship is helping her prepare for a career whose impact she already sees every day. Italia was a college employee whose family and friends established the scholarship in his memory after he passed away. Since 2007, the endowment and the awards it generates have steadily grown through stable investment management. It's also advanced Italia's legacy of caring by helping students pursue studies in administration of justice and careers in law enforcement.

The scholarship is not need-based. Rather, it reaches students with a solid academic record. It's helped Venegas cover the cost of books, a computer, and fuel to get to class. At Cochise, she's part of the Student Support Services / TRiO program, which supports low-income, first-generation and disabled students with tailored advising and tutoring, volunteer and leadership opportunities,

career development and testing, financial literacy training, and visits to four-year institutions.

"I have enjoyed all of my classes, but my favorite has been psychology with Dr. Quijada. And, without TRiO, I would have been lost."

Venegas works at the Boys & Girls Club of Bisbee (BGCB) and notes that she has seen changes in herself because of her experiences at Cochise College. In the fu-

ture, she plans to be part of the U.S. Customs and Border Patrol with the hopes of one day having her own squad and being a leader. She's also interested in real estate.

"Being here at the college and taking classes has honestly helped me be a more understanding person and be more patient. It's made me a good example for the kids I

work with. Cochise College has helped me think clearly, be more open-minded, and be aware of what is right and wrong. If you try, anything is possible to accomplish."

And there you have it...an example of the young people that BGCB and Cochise College set on their way to responsible adulthood. The Cochise College Foundation plays such an important role too, by ensuring your donations are secure, earn appropriate, stable returns, and end up supporting the journey of students like Priscilla. We couldn't do it without your help.
